

Work in Progress Clinics Provide Many Choices at the January Meet John V. Gallagher, Director, Clinics Coordinator

The January meet will follow the Work in Progress format. Members may remember the WIP at the 2009 Delanco meet and a similar clinic session during the Princeton Junction 2010 MER Convention.

For those unfamiliar with WIP, the clinics provide the member with choices of topics. Instead of the traditional one-size-fits-all clinic presented to all members, the WIP consists of four 30 minute sessions of simultaneous clinics. We set up the meet room with eight

or more stations. At each location, a clinician either presents a continuous project, or offers a 30 minute clinic. For the repeated 30 minute clinics, a bell will signal the beginning and end of each clinic session. For continuous projects, the bell has no real meaning. Members should feel free to join or leave any clinic at any time. The repeated clinics will start over for each 30 minute session with a five minute break in between.

Here is how you can help make it work. So far, for this meet, eight members from the New Jersey and Philadelphia Divisions volunteered to offer clinics. Check the listing of clinic topics and presenters on page 7. Preview the list and tentatively select the four clinics you want to attend. Then select alternates. Because the Philadelphia Division will be joining us, we will have a crowd! If you can't comfortable find a spot for a clinic, please go to another clinic from your selected preferences or alternates and wait until the next session, 35 minutes away.

The clinics provide up close and personal opportunities for you to see demonstrations clearly and ask questions during the clinic.

The clinicians will usually follow a planned presentation but feel free to ask question. It is informal, inter-See Clinics on page 6

VIEW FROM THE CAB

Thank you to all those who took the time to send in your division survey. It helps to know what you think we're doing well and what needs to be added, changed, or deleted from the division meets.

It looks like the vast majority of the 90 or so responders think we're headed in the right direction. One of the areas that you'd like to see changed is the amount of unstructured time, time for coffee, conversation, and checking out the sales tables. The down side, of course, is that there's correspondingly less time for clinics. Our goal then is to find a balance. We will try to keep the clinics to about two hours, which allows a hour, albeit in bits and pieces for the other stuff.

The Work in Progress style clinics at the January meet will have this unstructured approach throughout. Join in whatever clinic interests you, and leave at your discretion.

The clinic section of the survey showed that your most interested in modeling of both structures and rolling stock, prototype information and operations.

The meet schedule for the remainder of this year has all of that. Four of the eight WIP clinics will deal with scenery and weathering techniques. The March meet will feature a presentation of prototype information, and the May meet clinics will be on model building.

With the great success of the clinic on operations given by Joe Calderone and the follow up hands on operating session on Dick Genthner's railroad, we also place to schedule more of that type of clinic in the future.

Before the last couple of meets, I received requests from some members for rides to the meets. These came from folks who, for one reason or another, couldn't get there on their own.

This has me thinking that perhaps we should set up carpools for the meets. This would help the aforementioned members, and it would also help the environment and our wallets by cutting down on the number of vehicles travelling to the meets. So, here's my offer:

If you need a ride, if you have an extra seat or two in your vehicle to offer a ride, or if you'd like to set up your own carpool group, give me a call or an email with your name and the general area that you are in or from which you'd be willing to gather folks. I'll set up a spread sheet and try to match drivers and riders. I'll then notify the parties involved and you can make your own arrangements. There's no reason the railroading ahs to wait until you're in the building!


Last year I showed the group a prototype of a very inexpensive i.e. less than a buck each, turnout control that I was building. I've made a few important improvements to the design of that control.

For instance, I've found that Pop Rivets work MUCH better than super glue! Also, the throw

of the unit was not long enough for some turnouts, particularly, those Custom Line units from Atlas.

If you stop by my clinic station at the January meet, I'll show you how the units have been improved, and how cheaply, quickly, and easily they go together.

Try to stop by, but in case you don't get the opportunity, here are a few of photos of the units installed on my new railroad.

These have been approved and we are awaiting arrival of the certificates.

We also have several members associated with the New Jersey Division, but who actually live in the Garden State Division, and who have been busy in the Achievement Program. I will also show how to write up this scratch building effort in order to get the car judged

Joe Calderone has sent in his paper work for the VOLUNTEER certificate, and Jim Homoki and Jerry Kronengold have each received the Golden Spike Award during 2011. These awards actually will be counted as part of the North Eastern Region Achievement Program results for 2011. Congratulations to all of you!

Looking ahead, some time in 2012, I will be presenting a clinic on the AP, including a talk about scratch building one of those cardboard side refrigerated cars that the division distributed in 2011.

CLINIC SPOTLIGHT Joe Calderone



As you may recall, during our September Division meet I presented a clinic on my observations and thoughts on model railroad operations. This has been an area of the hobby which has captured much of my interest. I have, in fact, turned into sort of an ops junkie.

During the clinic I had made an offer to continue the clinic with an operations session to be hosted by Dick Genthner. Dick's Arpee and Western is a large HO scale layout with a comfortable crew lounge. After calling the crew and settling on a date we held the session on October 22 from 10:00 am to 1:00pm. Of the 15 who signed up we actually had 13 folks able to join us. This was certainly a great turnout! For the most part the crew arrived early and was eager to get going.

After an overview of the ops session by Joe, Dick gave the crew an explanation of his waybill system, the Lenz DCC and telephone communications systems, history of the A&W railroad and general items needed to bring the railroad to life. To help with the session we had some of Dick's regular crew available to assist the crews as needed, Bill Howard, Jim Homoki, Dick and yours truly.

There were several positions that we needed to fill immediately and Frank Neufeld bravely volunteered to dispatch the session, while Bob Clegg and Tom Griffiths signed on for the Arpee Yard crew, a key junction on the railroad. The remaining operators were paired as engineer and conductor to handle the various freights and passenger trains.

The crews included Jack Moore, Michael Mosher, John Vogler, Walt Koehler, Neil Baker, Bob Hans, Grant Cunningham, Ron Baile, Chuck Higdon and Bill Grosse.

Overall Dick reported that 14 of 26 daily trains were run during the session which covered a

fast time of 12 hours on Dick's 6 to 1 fast clock.

We finished up the session with the customary debriefing of what worked, what didn't and answered other questions the crew had. This was all followed with a pizza lunch and some laughs. Dick also handed out a receipt to the operators to track their time on the railroad to use for their advancement points need for the Dispatcher AP certificate.



In my clinic I first touched on lots of reasons why building a module might be the right choice for you. From trying something new, to doing a project you can actually finish, to getting out of the armchair and trying some of your skills out, there are plenty of reasons why building a module might be a good fit for you. And one thing you can do with your module once it reaches a certain level of completion is take it on the road. From local Division Meets, to larger shows, there are opportunities to participate once you become a module owner.

One great opportunity is the Timonium train show. A Free-mo layout is now a regular staple of this event, and if you have a module, you can bring it to the show and participate as a presenter at the show. At the October Timonium show, I again participated with the Capitol Free-mo group. We set up a nice layout and conducted some informal operations, while al-

so discussing model railroading in general and Free-mo in particular with the train show attendees. It was a lot of fun and I look forward to the next Timonium show.

WORK IN PROGRESS CLINICS AT THE JANUARY MEET

1. Creating your own Grassmaster – Pete Suhmann

Pete's clinic will demonstrate how you can make your own static grass applicator using an economical electric fly swatter. The commercial grass applicator is expensive. See how Pete modifies the fly swatter and uses it to apply upstanding grass. Creative Pete may also show some other modeling tools he made.

2. Soldering Techniques - Ron Baile

Ron will demonstrate a number of techniques in soldering, applied to model railroading. His approach will meet the needs of modelers who avoid this process and those experts who could use a review of the basics.

3. Tree Making and Scenery Techniques - Bob Clegg

Bob will describe and demonstrate his approach to making trees for the layout. We all need trees and commercial trees stress the wallet. See how Bob saves while making trees. He may throw in other scenery techniques too.

4. Mass-producing Inexpensive Trees the Kimmons Way – Arnold Kimmons

5. Using Magnets in Model Railroading – John Swift







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
