#### Mitch Dakelman Returns

The March meet of the New Jersey Division will again be held at the club house building at Switlik Park in Hamilton Township. Come out to enjoy all the features of our meets.

The main event will be the return of Mitch Dakelman. This time, Mitch has two prototype videos that should appeal to a broad range of interests.

Mitch says, "The Modern Coal Burning Steam Locomotive, a 16 mm Kodachrome and narrated film made by the Norfolk and Western Shops during the early 1940s, which depicts the building of modern coal burning locomotives, focusing on the famous streamlined J class 4-8-4, and how they are serviced and maintained."

"What is so neat about this film, is that the print looks as if it were made yesterday, and that no diesel locomotives are ever in sight. There are also run by shots of trains passing through the West Virginia mountains and the flatlands of southern Ohio."

"The other film, The California Zephyr, focuses on the original 1949 train, including CB&Q F3s, D&RGW PAs in their original silver scheme, and the WP's F7s."

As noted at the right, the topic of the contest this time is "Detailed display, scene, or diorama." It's another chance to exhibit your modeling skills.

#### **ACHIEVEMENT PROGRAM NEWS**

#### PJ MATTSON, MMR & DICK GENTHNER, MMR

Four of our members have made real progress this month. Bob Price has been awarded the Association Official award for his service to the Mid Eastern Region. Dick Perry has been awarded the Electrical award for the electrical features on his home layout. Congratulations Bob and Dick. Another member has completed the work in different area and have submitted the paperwork for approval. Tom Griffiths work on Locomotives has been sent to the NMRA. I hope that his certificate will arrive before the next meet.

Over the last three Clinkers, the Achievement Program News has covered how to get stared in the Achievement Program and some explanations of the Golden Spike Award and the topics of "Service to the Hobby" and "Railroad Construction and Operation." These two aroupings cover six of the Achievement Program certificates that you can earn. This month I'll cover the grouping called "Railroad This grouping covers three more certificates, Structures, Scenery and Prototype Models. These are three of the harder certificates to earn, and all three require judging of your modeling efforts. Let's talk about them one at a time.

Structures requires that you build twelve structures, and including six different types of structures, one type must be a bridge or trestle. The regulations state that of the twelve models at least six must be scratch built. Of the remaining six, they must be super-detailed with scratch built or commercial parts. The last re-

quirement is that six of the models must be judged and earn a score of at least 87-1/2 points when judged. The 87½ points qualifies these models to get a Merit Award certificate. This does sound hard and complicated, doesn't it?

One thing to remember is that you build them one at a time, and this can be done over a number of years. You can get them judged as you build them or get them all judged at the same time. You can build several of the same type of building as long as you six different types. The models that you present for judging can be any of the twelve, but most likely would be the ones you scratch build since you can earn more points for the scratch-building effort. And don't forget that one must be a bridge or trestle. You can build multiple bridges as long as you have six types of models. The other thought is that since you must build twelve models you can learn about scratch-building as you go along as well as how models get judged and by the time you get through all twelve the process will seem much easier. One way is to start with a kit and super detail it, add some scratch built parts, fill out the paperwork for judging and then get it judged. Jump right in and see that it is not that hard once you learn the system.

It should not be a surprise that Scenery actually requires the building of a certain number of square feet of model railroad scenery. The number of square feet varies for different scales and in HO scale the requirement is for

32 square feet of finished scenery, the equivalent of the 4 X 8 sheet of plywood, with which most of us started years ago. This can be on a home layout or a club layout as long as you do all the work. This can be several different areas that add up to the 32 square foot minimum, and this scenery must be judged.

If you look at the Scenery judging sheet you will see what the judges will be looking for. There are five elements used in judging, i.e. Terrain, Structures, Background, Lighting, and Realism/Conformity and each of these areas is worth so many points. For instance under terrain (worth 35 points maximum) the judges consider how well you have modeled all of the natural features like rocks, roadbed, hills, embankments etc. all of which comprise the terrain. Then the judges will look at the structures and how they fit and appear in the terrain, the background treatment, the lighting, and the overall realism/conformity of the scene. To finish preparing for scenery judging you must prepare a set of photos and a description of the setting and listing of the materials and methods of construction.

Your probably will most of this work while you are building your layout or your club's railroad, in fact you may already have most of the work done. Just read the requirements and then figure how to present your scenic efforts for a judge to look at. You pick the areas to be judged as long as they add up to the total re-

At the end of January, I attended the Big 'E' Train Show in Springfield, Massachusetts, as I have for a few years now. But this year I brought along my module to set up in a layout of the New England Free-mo group. Wow, what a great time. First, the NE Free-mo guys are a great bunch, friendly, helpful, and good modelers too. Not only did they put together a large layout, and introduce a lot of people to the Free-mo concept, they actually conducted multiple operating sessions on the layout. It was terrific, running a train and doing set outs and pick-ups at various towns and industries. And also working out train meets along the way. It really demonstrated the brilliance of the Free-mo concept. My module fit right in between 2 other modules built hundreds of miles away with no issues, and the layout was more than just a display, it was an operating model railroad. I know a few NJ Division members were at the show and said hello, but I am sure I may have also missed a few of you as I did venture out into the show myself to browse and pick up a few new items!

I recently looked over my module travel log and see I just passed 3200 miles of travel on the module, setting up at over 20 events. It is a "doable" project, one that encompasses all facets of model railroading without being an overwhelming project like a large home layout that can be hard to even start, let alone finish.

In either case, turn left onto Kim Valley Road.





From high above the small community of Coldwater NY, a New Jersey and Western local crosses the creek as it returns from switching local industries.


NJ&W 303 has traffic stopped as it blows for the crossing on Mountain Rd. In Coldwater NY.

NYS&W 202 is working the interchange yard at Beaver Creek. No one has noticed the gas station attendant is having some difficulty.








